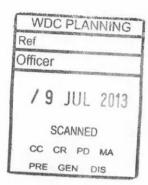

The Local Plan is a complex document and rather than pick out specifics I would rather comment in more general terms.

Firstly, what has brought about the deletion of all sites that were earmarked for development on the north side of Leamington?

The argument would seem to be that the sites are located in Green Belt Land, and there were objections to the releasing of land from the green belt.

As a result a major proportion of the new development sites are now being concentrated on environmentally and visually sensitive sites to the south of Warwick, on green field sites which apparently come lower down the pecking order than green belt sites. The environmental and traffic congestion problems that this will generate seem to have also had a lesser consideration.

The green belt plan to prevent urban coalescence is now over 50 years old and in need of changing, so as to ensure a plan for the orderly, fair and sustainable development of Warwick and Leamington.

Over the past 10 years Warwick has grown at a rate of 1% per annum. This is double the rate of growth for the County of Warwickshire, and the national average. Surely it is time to look elsewhere whilst the current building programme is assimilated into the current structure.

In 2000 the Air Quality regulations for England set out objectives for improving the air quality in our urban areas. The nitrous dioxide levels in both Warwick and Leamington still remain well above the levels set, and very little seems to have been done about bringing them down. Now the Local Plan is advocating that we tinker with our highways to cope with even more traffic which will have the effect of further worsening the already illegal level. This will add to an increase in health problems, further damage to our historic buildings and lead to a deterioration in living conditions for those citizens of Warwick who live in or near the old town. Many of whom have lived here for a long time – surely their needs should be afforded the same consideration as those who will be living in the proposed new houses.

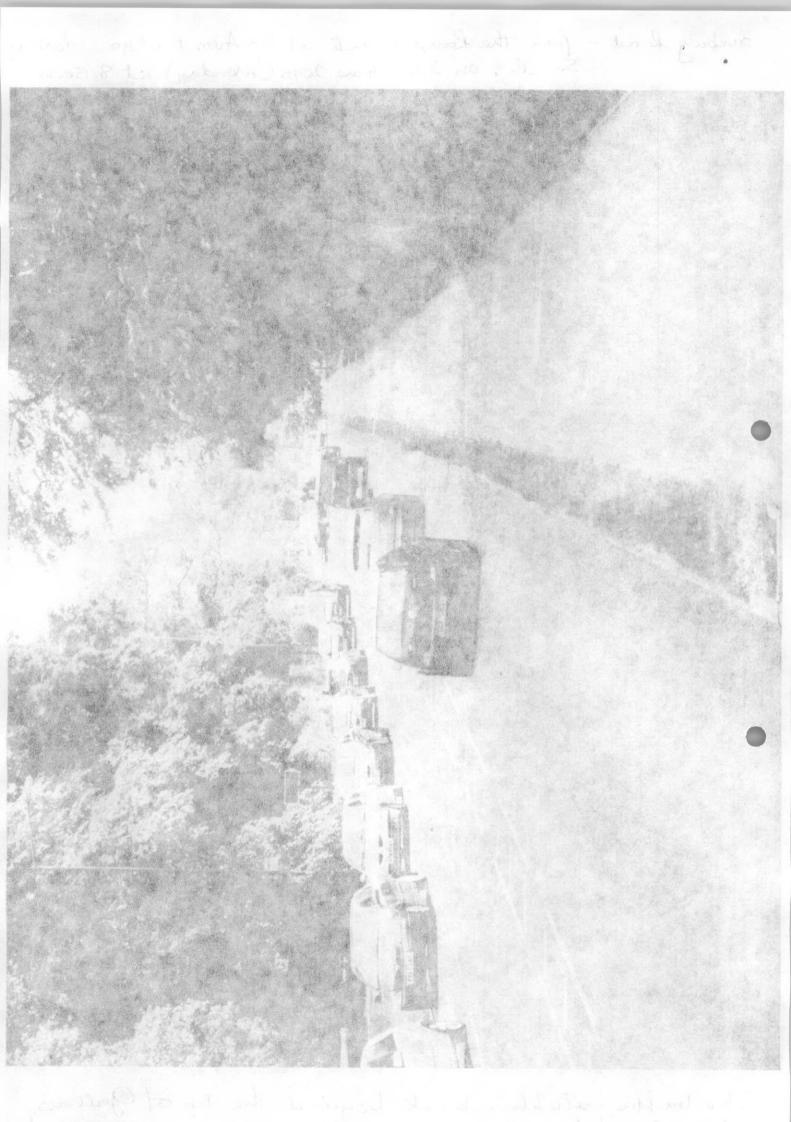

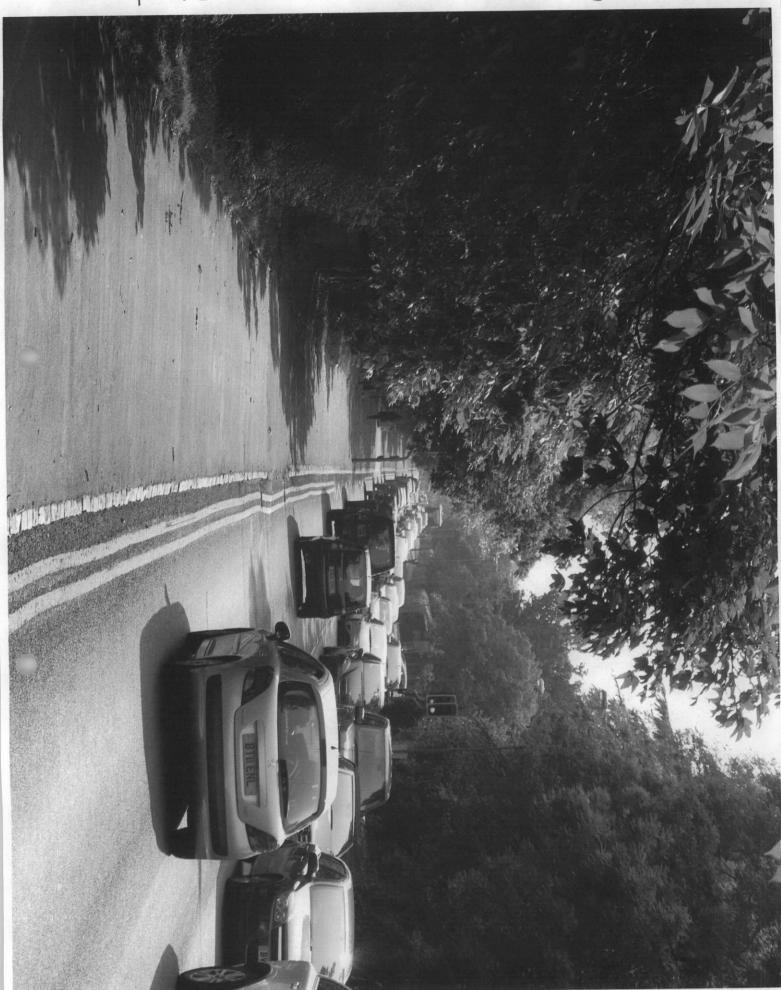
