Re: Local Plan Preferred Options.

I am concerned that much of the growth of Kenilworth over the last 40 years has been on the eastern side of the town, which has eroded an already narrow green belt on the border with Coventry. Although I appreciate that development is necessary, I feel that the proposal to build such a large number of houses on one site, which will further reduce the green belt area and mean a loss of both the cricket and rugby clubs; which play an important part in family life in Kenilworth; is detrimental to the environment of what was once a relatively small, friendly town.

When much of Knights' Meadow was developed, promises were made of a new primary school, doctors' surgery etc; all we received were a few shops and a pub. Heyes Lane school is now a very large secondary school, so seven to eight hundred more homes will create additional pressure on it.

Another concern is the impact this development will have on an already, often congested road system, to the existing residents of this area of Kenilworth.

There is also a further question of the cost to develop this site so that all the necessary facilities, for so many extra families are met; schools, doctors, roads, car parks, relocation of the rugby and cricket clubs, recreation and play areas. Who is to burden this cost when Kenilworth

is already one of the most expensive places to live in the area?

Could not this one large concentration of homes be split, so that the western side of Kenilworth takes some of the brunt? The 6th Form Centre or Castle Farm could be considered as options, so that perhaps the cricket club could be 'saved' and development onto the green belt is restricted.
